It was therefore an easy decision for the WCBA Board to continue this recipe for the August summer sectional. I hope that most of our members were able to play at least one of the three days and were successful in adding to their silver masterpoint total.

In other news, we had two resignations from our Board of Directors: Betty Heller, who returned to teaching full-time, and Nancy Widman, who moved to New Jersey. Editor's Corner



A funny thing happened to me at a recent club game. Twice during the same session I declared contracts after opponents overcalled on 3-card suits!

The first time occurred against experienced opponents.. The auction went as follows:

Me	LHO	Partner	RHO
1♥	1♠	2♠	Pass
4♥	Pass	Pass	4♠
6♥	All Pass		

RHO hesitated a long time before bidding 4♠, and commented before trick 1 that he was afraid by bidding 4♠ this was going to happen. My hand: ♠xxx ♥AKQJxx ♦Axx ♣A. I am in shock when dummy tables something like: ♠xx ♥9xxx ♦Kxx ♣QJxxx. (Yes, cue-bidding instead of leaping to 4♥ would have worked out better, but that's hindsight. And passing over 4♠ and then pulling my partner's double to 5♥ as a slam try would have worked - if we were on the same wavelength.) Before I bid 6♥, I had figured there couldn't be more than one spade in dummy, so my partner had to have fitting values, which makes 6H virtually cold. I play out the hand, going down the expected 1 trick. To my partner, I point out the opponents were unexpectedly in only an 8-card fit. In response, it is pointed out that RHO had the 5-card spade suit, and LHO had bid on ♠AKJ just for lead direction!

For the last round, we are playing against an inexperienced pair. On the very

last hand, I open 1♣ in first seat, LHO overcalls 1♦, partner negative doubles. We climb our way up to 2♥, declared by me, and I make 3. The hand very much played itself, and I didn't pay much attention to the opponents' distribution after I successfully took a trump finesse and pulled trumps from tricks 2-4. (Dummy had ♥xxxx, I held ♥AKJx, and RHO held ♥Qxx.) No matter what happened after trick 4, I was going to finish with exactly nine tricks. The hand seemed so unremarkable, and I am surprised when I look at the traveler and see we got the best score in the field for our direction. At most other tables, the contract was 2♠ or 3♠ in the other direction making or down one. Spades were never bid at our table, and at first I just chalked it up to the opponent's timidity. But my partner had been paying closer attention. She observed some diamond discards by my RHO, and realized that LHO had overcalled on a 3-card suit. The 1♦ overcall combined with a negative double that could have included 4 spades effectively shut up my RHO.

Go figure.

This N' That From Your District Director

I'm back from the NABC in Nashville. And it was quite a town. There was sunny, warm weather every day; good sightseeing including the Hermitage, the home of President Andrew Jackson; Bi-Centennial Park; the Country Music Museum; barbecue lunches in spots playing country music; dinner at the Opryland Hotel; and going to the Grand Ole Opry to hear country music at its best. Playing conditions were great, and the host unit offered the best southern hospitality. The only minus was that the hotel attached to the convention center was undergoing renovations, so restaurant and bar service were at a minimum, and elevator service less than that. The other featured hotels were several blocks away and required an uphill walk after the session. The attendance was 12,879 tables, which for an anticipated small summer NABC is quite good.

Most of you play regularly in club games, and are probably aware that there are "special" fund games that cost an extra dollar for the entry fee and award extra masterpoints. The MPs are

black, but are sectionally rated with a very large overall award. There was a motion on the agenda of the Board of Directors to cut back on games of this nature. Currently there is no limit. This motion was defeated. Simply put, any club for an extra \$1/player/session can run these games 365 days and nights of the year. You probably think this is super because the extra money goes to the Charity Foundation, Junior Fund, International Fund, or (as of this meeting) the Educational Foundation at the choice of your club owner, and there are points galore. But it has the potential of really hurting some clubs who have players who don't want to pay the extra \$1, and of also hurting sectionals if enough clubs start to do this.

Our District 3 regional held at the Sheraton in Parsippany in July was a huge success. We thank you all for making this happen. 1,691 tables were in play, up 25% from last year. We apologize for the broken up playing space, and want everyone to know that next year we are moving to the Crowne Plaza in Fairfield, NJ - just 10 minutes

away from the hotel in Parsippany. Next year we are back on the July 4th weekend, so plan to spend your holiday with us.

What's in store for this fall? The North American Pairs final will be held on Sunday, September 23. All flights will be held in Allendale, NJ at the auditorium of the Guardian Angel Church. In addition, there will be a second section for Flight C held in Schenectady, NY at the Studio of Bridge and Games. Flight C will be scored across the field at both sites, with at least one qualifier guaranteed from each site.

Then be back with us in Danbury, CT for the fall regional from October 8 - 14. Fall foliage at its best. A wonderful schedule chock full of Swiss Teams, KOs, Compact KOs, and even pair games. See New England at its best and spend some great days with us.

Team Tribulations

Rounding up the Usual Suspects, we enter the local Sarasota sectional Swiss Teams. In the first round, we face a team with considerably fewer masterpoints than we have. You are sitting South. On the first board, both sides are vulnerable, and you pick up in fourth seat:

♠- ♥AQ10xxxxx ♦xxx ♣Jx.

The auction goes 3♠ - Pass - Pass to you. What is going on here? You could easily have game, but so could they.

Ignoring the little voice saying, "Moron," in your ear, you bid 4♥. Two passes follow, and East doubles. You pass, West passes, and partner bids 4NT. East doubles again. 4NT must be to play, so you pass and play it there. Partner goes down -1100, as he had:

♠KJ9xx ♥- ♦AKJxx ♣xxx.

East had:

♠Q ♥KJ9xx ♦Qxx ♣AKQx.

You manage to play decently well in the next six boards, and hope not to lose the round too badly. Surprise! At the other table, East raised to 4♠, doubled 5♥, and then got to double 6♦ for +1100. Just a routine push.

After winning the first round, you gain momentum and are leading going into the final round. In first seat, with neither side vulnerable, you pick up:

♠Jxx ♥A10xx ♦KQx ♣AQx.

You open 1NT, partner raises it to 3NT, and you play it there. Dummy tables:

♠xx ♥KQx ♦Axxx ♣Kxxx.

The opening lead is a low spade. East plays the ♠Q, and returns the ♠10. You duck, but to no avail. The opponents take the first 5 spade tricks for down 1.

It seems a like it should be a routine push. But no. Your teammate sitting West, lacking an outside entry, from AKxxx led the ♠K followed the ♠A blocking the suit. Whatever happened to fourth best leads? If partner has ♠Qxx (as here), the contract is down fast. Or if partner has two low spades, an outside entry, and at least 3 cards in each outside suit, the contract also must fail. Playing safe to prevent overtricks is nothing compared to the disaster of not setting the contract.

At least it was a non-vulnerable game. And due to a bidding misunderstanding by our opponents, we undeservedly won the event.

Mirror Doubles

There are far fewer uncontested auctions these days. People are bidding more with less. Regardless of whether you welcome or oppose this trend, it is a fact of life that you have to contend with.

For example, there are a plethora of methods used to compete against a 1NT opening bid. Any overcall over 1NT will interfere with Stayman, and bids higher than 2♣ interfere with Jacoby. In some circumstances, the overcaller makes the exact bid you were intended to make.

One solution often used by newer players is the mirror double. When this convention is used, it indicates that the opponent made the bid that you intended. As an example:

1NT - 2♦ - Double

The double would mean a transfer to hearts. Opener is expected to complete the transfer as if the auction had gone 1NT - Pass - 2♦. When using mirror doubles, in the auction 1NT - 2♦ - 2♥, the 2♥ bid is still a transfer to spades.

The convention has applications in other areas besides over 1NT. Bids over Blackwood, Gerber, a strong 2♣ opener, and Ogust can also be countered with mirror doubles. You can also use mirror doubles against conventional cue-bids (such as Michaels).

It seems simple enough. And many novice players adopt this convention (especially over 1NT, before they are exposed to lebensohl). But, as with any convention, there are other ramifications and downsides.

One ramification is the loss of other meanings for the double. If a double is mirror, it can't be penalty, DOPI/ DIPO/DEPO/DOPE, general value showing, or negative.

Mirror doubles also interfere with other conventions. It is difficult and confusing (but not impossible) to integrate mirror double with lebensohl. You can't play DOPI (or its kin) and mirror doubles at the same time. It's either mirror or penalty or negative - you can't have it all.

Nor is it a panacea. A mirror double will not help you transfer to hearts if an opponent overcalls 1NT with 2♠.

On the plus side, mirror double are simple. There are also inferences that can be drawn from a pass. Here three examples where inferences are available from passes:

- a) 2♣ - 2♥ - Pass
- b) 4NT (regular Blackwood) - 5♥ - Pass
- c) 2♥ - Pass - 2NT (Ogust) - 3♦
Pass

In the first example, responder has shown a weak hand. If playing steps or controls, responder has specifically shown the equivalent of a 2♦ response (in which case the pass should be alerted as such). In the second sequence, responder has shown 0 aces or 1 ace. If playing another form of Blackwood, responder shows the equivalent of a 5♣ or a 5♦ response in that style. In the last sequence, opener has specifically shown the equivalent of a 3♣ response.
